

DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Police Department's mission is to "Serve, protect and enhance the quality of life through community partnerships." The Police Department is committed to the philosophy of community policing. By working together with citizens, businesses, schools, community groups, elected officials, public agencies, and other village departments, we can make a difference. The employees are empowered to take ownership over their particular area of assignment, and to be proactive in identifying and solving problems in the community. By embracing the village's organizational values of customer service, respect, trust, teamwork and integrity, public confidence will be maintained.

The Police Department is divided into four divisions, Patrol, Administration, Investigations, and Special Operations, each commanded by a Commander. With a mix of sworn and civilian personnel, an efficient and effective work force is provided. The vision of the Police Department is to "be a model law enforcement agency viewed internally and externally as professional, enthusiastic, trustworthy, and at the forefront of the police profession." The members of the Police Department are committed toward the attainment of this vision.

KEY ACTIVITIES


- **Structure Fire** - 2382 Good Speed Lane - The Police Department assisted the Fire Department with an apartment fire that damaged 12 units. Social services and Red Cross were on scene to assist with displaced residents. The fire is under investigation.
- **Man with a Gun** - 100 block of east Wise Road - An unknown male subject kicked in a door and brandished a handgun. Police Department units checked area after subject fled. Incident was turned over to Investigations.
- **Strong Armed Robbery** - Freedom Park 880 Pinehurst Drive - A 13 year old had his bicycle taken from six male subjects. Incident was turned over to investigations after the area was searched.
- **Heroin Arrest** - An officer stopped to assist a motorcycle that was out of gas. A check on the driver revealed several outstanding warrants and a subsequent search both on scene and at the police department revealed 22 packets of heroin. The Special Operations Division was notified.
- **Robbery** – 2200 block Pennview Lane - Two subjects took an Uber to Pennview to purchase drugs in the laundry room of the building. Two masked subjects armed with a handgun took their US Currency. Both victims were juveniles and were turned over to their parents, investigations was notified.
- **Missing Suicidal Subject** - A missing suicidal subject was located at Higgins Road and RT. 53. The subject was in possession of a handgun, and subsequently transported to the hospital.

Adjudication is the process in which a person can contest a ticket that they received; these are the numbers for contested tickets compared to the same time last year.




A comparative view of activity from the previous 6 months.

NOTABLE ACTIVITIES

Below are summaries from the Patrol, Investigations, and Special Operations Divisions as well as the Crime Prevention Section for activities that occurred during June 2017.

Investigations Division

- **Predatory Criminal Sexual Assault of Child** - Detectives arrested a 72 year old male in regards to an investigation involving the sexual abuse/assault of two children. Detectives worked in conjunction with the Cook County States Attorney's Office, Children's Advocacy Center, and ILDCFS. After conducting interviews of the victims, corroborating witnesses, and the offender, charges were approved for both victims. The offender was living and assisting a female home day care provider when the alleged abuse occurred. Class X Felonies were approved.
- **Domestic Battery** - Detectives assisted patrol in the arrest of a co-defendant in regards to a domestic battery. Patrol responded to a domestic involving the victim and her granddaughters. Upon arrival, it was determined a physical confrontation took place whereby the victim was attacked and punched by her granddaughters. One was arrested on scene and one fled. After numerous attempts to locate the co-defendant, an arrest warrant was issued. The second offender was subsequently located, arrested, and transported to the department for an interview. Statements were taken and an arrest was made for domestic battery. The victim did not want to pursue felony charges and proceeded only with misdemeanor complaints.
- **Death Investigation** - Patrol responded to St. Alexius Medical Center in Hoffman Estates in regards to a deceased 27 year old male dropped off by friends. Detectives responded and learned the following; three individuals were living in an apartment in Schaumburg and awoke to one subject unconscious on the floor of the kitchen. The victim was taken by car to the hospital by friends who briefly met with hospital personnel and then left the area. Surveillance video confirmed their identity and corroborated their account of events. A search of the apartment and vehicle was conducted and drug paraphernalia was discovered. The victim's parents were located and confirmed the victim had struggled with a drug addiction in the past. Both roommates were cooperative, denied any drug use, and did provide emergency medical treatment for the victim. This case was subsequently closed pending the Medical Examiners Toxicology report.
- **Disorderly Conduct** - A juvenile was arrested for disorderly conduct after fighting and causing a disturbance with neighbors. The juvenile was petitioned to court due to his frequent

contact with police and ongoing problems in the neighborhood. Juvenile detectives are working in conjunction with the beat sergeant and juvenile probation department to address this issue.

- **Retail Theft** - Detectives investigated a retail theft at Target involving a former employee. The ex-employee was viewed on surveillance video removing a pair of sandals, putting them on her feet, and leaving the store without paying for the items. A few days later, the same offender was arrested at Target for attempting to commit another retail theft. She was arrested and interviewed. She advised she committed the thefts because she was angry with Target for firing her last year. She was arrested for two counts of retail theft and issued a trespass warning.
- **Liquor Ordinance Compliance Operation- Delivery of Alcohol to Minor** - The Liquor Compliance Investigator conducted two liquor operations within town this month. Over 60 establishments holding Village of Schaumburg liquor licenses were checked. Two establishments were cited for serving the Alcohol Compliance Agents who are employed by the Village. These establishments are to appear at a liquor hearing in the near future. The division will continue to aggressively check establishments to ensure all Village and State Laws are being followed in regards to serving and selling alcohol to minors.
- **Division Training** - Crisis Intervention Certification and Encase Certification- Detectives continued to certify for this week long training in conjunction with the patrol division. Our new financial crimes detective is beginning the process of getting his certification in Encase. This intense computer forensic examination/certification is necessary for his ability to identify, extract and testify in court in regards computer and cell phone extraction and examination. This certification is necessary in order to operate the department FRED (Forensic Recovery Examination Device) Computer.

Crime Prevention

Volunteer Program

- During the month of June, police department volunteers provided almost 50 hours of valuable assistance. CPAAAS volunteers assisted Crime Prevention with our Youth Citizen Police Academy as well as the Church of the Holy Spirit event on June 24.

Presentations

- June 1, Crime Prevention did a presentation at the Ender Salk Elementary 6th grade graduation event for 55 students and staff.

- June 20, Crime Prevention discussed Neighborhood Watch and National Night Out with board members at Lexington Green II.



Tours

- On June 21, Crime Prevention conducted a tour for the Great Safety Adventure kids.

Program

- June 19 – 23, Community Outreach conducted their first Youth Citizen Police Academy program. Sixteen teenagers participated in a week long program including activities such as mock traffic stops, crime scenes, CPR certification and completing a community service project for our active military service members.

Miscellaneous

- June 10, Community Outreach participated in the Special Olympics Summer Games to present medals and display a squad car for the athletes.
- June 26, Crime Prevention participated in the Schaumburg Park District’s Safety Town event. Crime Prevention discussed children’s safety tips on strangers, 9-1-1 and police officers.
- Crime Prevention, with the assistance of CPAAAS, participated in the Church of the Holy Spirit event which was held on Saturday, June 24. Crime Prevention home safety information was distributed.

Crime Free Multi Housing

Crime Free Multi Housing Officer Deb Zelinka conducted a Crime Free Multi Housing seminar. Twenty students attended the seminar.

Special Operations Division

During the month, Tactical Unit officers alone affected 28 drug related arrests, five of which were felony cases. Additionally, the officers conducted 68 traffic stops, issuing 12 citations, 20 written warnings and 40 compliance tickets. The officers assigned to the Tactical Unit handled 120 calls for service throughout the month, 98 of which were self-initiated activity.

Tactical Unit Officers conducting self-initiated enforcement located a 16-year-old working as a prostitute in a local hotel and investigated as a human trafficking incident. The juvenile was placed with DCFS and an investigation into the trafficking offender was launched. SPD was unable to obtain approval on local charges but officers and detectives are working with Downers Grove Police in reference to potential charges in that jurisdiction.

The Tactical Unit Officers continue to work on a Problem Oriented Policing project aimed at reducing prostitution. A prostitution operation was conducted at a local hotel with one subject being cited for soliciting for sex with an undercover officer. During the operation, a second subject was charged with solicitation of prostitution. In addition to these types of enforcement, the officers are each assigned to several hotels and they are responsible for walk-throughs and visits with on-duty staff. These routine checks are geared toward reducing potential criminal activity and building close working relationships with the hotels. In June 2016, hotel checks were completed 64 times by officers. In May, this initiative was selected as a goal for the police department. Tactical Unit and Patrol officers increased efforts, completing a total of 69 hotel checks in June 2017.

Members of the Tactical Unit provided a presentation on Human Trafficking at Meet Chicago Northwest during a monthly meeting with all local hotels. Representatives from approximately 25 hotels were present. Additionally, officers assisted with the first youth Citizen's Police Academy.

A Tactical Unit Sergeant held the first Prostitution coalition meeting to exchange intelligence reference to prostitution and massage establishment enforcement. He had received responses from numerous departments interested in attending, although only one department was able to make this meeting. A follow up meeting will be scheduled soon.

With the start of the summer season, Traffic officers have been asked to conduct additional enforcement in the area of the Schaumburg Park District pools. These areas are known to create additional traffic coupled with an increase in children being present. Results are as follows:

Traffic Unit Officers completed Phase 4 of a Problem Oriented Policing effort to reduce injury accidents throughout the village. During this phase the officers focused on Woodfield Road between Plum Grove Road and E. Frontage Road. This phase included the month of May and June. Post initiative analysis indicates the police department handled four injury accidents during May/June of 2016 and the exact same amount in May/June 2017. Enforcement results are as follows:

Total hours of enforcement: 61.75

Traffic stops: 279

Moving Violations: 157 (123 cell phone violations)

Written Warnings: 64 (50 cell phone violations)

Municipal Tickets: 65 (58 seat belt violations)

Total arrests: 5

Officers will begin Phase 5 in July and August, focusing on Wise Road between Plum Grove and Irving Park Roads.

Patrol Division

Beat 1 - Sergeant McCartney

Selective Enforcement

Area of Knollwood and Pennview.

Beat Projects

Officers increased patrol activity in the 2333/2335 Bode Road plaza area - "Bode Liquors"/ "Cosmos Smoke and Vape" due to reported nuisance and safety complaints. Code Enforcement was also involved in clarifying possible ordinance violations at the "Cosmos Smoke and Vape" shop. No further disturbance issues were noted.

Quality of Life Issues

Officers responded to a report of an armed robbery in the 2000 block of Pennview. While investigating, officers discovered the victims were meeting the offenders to purchase narcotics. There were no complaints to pursue. Property management was informed of this activity and will monitor to report any other problems.

Complaints of criminal damage to vehicles were made. There are no suspects and a Special Watch is still in effect to possibly locate an offender.

Emergency units responded to the 2000 block of Good Speed Lane for a fire which caused extensive damages and several tenants to be displaced. No injuries reported and property owners have begun repairs.

Meetings with Citizens/Organizations/Property Management

Woodbury Place Apartment managers contacted the Beat Coordinator for information regarding a tenant family involved in a physical altercation with subjects from Hoffman Estates. The residents were engaged in this disturbance and initially did not fully cooperate with police. New property management advised they would continue to monitor and take necessary action for any further issues. The Beat Coordinator was also advised the property representatives are scheduled to attend the upcoming Crime Free Multi-Housing training session.

Special Watches/Alerts/Missing Persons

There were seven incidents where subjects were cited for cannabis violations in Beat 1. There were two similar reports of fraudulent money used for services.

A Special Watch is in effect at this time and officers have been directed to increase police presence during operational hours of the “Cosmos Smoke and Vape Shop”.

Officers will increase patrols and monitor Schaumburg Terrace, Woodbury Place Apartments, Castle Rock, and Sheffield Manor subdivisions for suspicious/criminal activity and use enforcement strategies accordingly – this is on-going.

Public Service Announcements

Residents need to notify 9-1-1 immediately when they see suspicious activity.

Noteworthy Arrests

1st Watch beat officer conducted a traffic stop of a vehicle driving 62 mph on Golf Road in a posted 35 mph zone. The driver was investigated, cited and released.

Beat 4 – Sergeant P. Christiansen

Selective Enforcement

Officers will monitor Roselle Road and Neri Drive for traffic violations.

Beat Projects

A complaint of speeding autos in the 200 block of Pleasant Drive was received. Beat officers assigned selective enforcement sheet for location. Ten hours were spent monitoring this location; five citations for speeding were issued. The speed trailer was used at location for a study.

Complaint of speeding autos at the curve on north Salem between Parker and Roxbury. Beat officers were assigned selective enforcement for this location. Six hours were spent at the location, one speeding citation and four written warnings.

Complaint of speeding autos at Weathersfield Way and Marie Lane. Two citations for speeding were issued.

Complaints of stop sign violations and speeding autos at Salem Drive and Duxbury Lane. Thirteen hours were spent monitoring this location. Seven citations for stop sign violations, six written warnings for stop sign violations, and eight citations for speed violations were issued.

Complaint of vehicle blocking the sidewalks outside of allowed hours at Bramble Lane and Bramble Court. Beat officer spoke with residents and advised of hours/violation. Residents were unaware of ordinance and advised they would comply. No violations since beat officer spoke with residents.

We received a complaint of improper parking on a driveway in the 300 block of Timbercrest Court. This is a code violation and code enforcement was notified.

One citation issued for loitering/trespassing at Farmgate Plaza. Officers will continue to monitor this area, as it is an ongoing project.

Quality of Life Issues

A traffic enforcement agreement has been prepared with Lakewood Condominiums. We are waiting for approval to begin enforcement.

Beat 7 - Sergeant Greenaway

Selective Enforcement

During the month, beat officers continued to enforce stop sign violations and speed violations on Perimeter Drive. Officers have also been asked to check the parking lots for burglaries to motor vehicles.

Beat Projects

Officers utilized available time to conduct daily patrols of parking lots, and issued numerous crime prevention forms for valuables left in plain view inside parked vehicles. During the month, there was no burglary to vehicle reports. In comparison, in June 2016 there were two burglary to vehicle reports.


Quality of Life Issues

Officers are engaging in walk and talks inside Woodfield Mall. This is a high visibility program that receives positive feedback from mall security and mall tenants.

Meetings with Citizens/Organizations/Property Management

On June 30, Sergeants Greenaway and Nowicki and met with approximately 25 people consisting of Simon Properties Management, various loss prevention personnel from numerous retailers and Woodfield Security to discuss "Flocking". We presented a slide show and video presentation, and then ended with a question and answer session. The focus of the meeting was to discuss ways to deter groups from flocking.


BEAT MAP



KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS


KPI 1: Average Response Time for Police Top Priority Calls

Responding to emergency calls for service is one of the most fundamental services a police department can provide to the residents of that municipality. Providing police service quickly when an emergency occurs is a critical measure of success. This specific performance indicator has not historically been measured in Schaumburg, therefore no benchmark exists. However, our benchmark on this indicator is to maintain current emergency response levels, or to decrease the police response time from year-to-year.




KPI 2: Community Outreach

Given significant local and national events, there is demand for open communication and transparency from the Police Department. This KPI will be part of a greater focus on community policing activities within the department in 2017. By proactively reaching out and connecting with demographic specific targets, the police department can build relationships prior to a potential critical incident involving a member of that group.




KPI 3: Traffic Crashes

Traffic safety is a relevant issue for residents and visitors alike. Unlike violent crime, which is less common in Schaumburg, several traffic crashes occur in the village every day. The latest statistics provided by the police crime analyst reveal there has been a steady increase over three years in total crashes, with 495 crashes in 2015 resulting in injuries. In order to reduce the number of traffic accidents, the village positions auxiliary officers during peak hours at locations that experience a high volume of accidents.




KPI 4: Training Received Per Patrol Officer

The department includes internal and external training events and time for each officer. The department promotes external training when available, and builds on training time by conducting additional in-shift training. Further, the department taps into the knowledge of the sergeants and identifies them as subject matter experts in one specific field, to which they can share training on this topic with their shift and perhaps the other patrol shifts as they are able. Additionally, this will enhance the skills and ability of officers and develop leadership skills in the sergeants.



KPI 5: Investigations Closed

The Police Department will look to maintain the percentage of investigations closed. We do so by a monthly supervisor review at the command level, to ensure quality. Also documentation of good and bad cases will be made public to enhance training within the unit.



KPI 6: Special Operations Hotel Program

Increase hotel building check UCR calls for service, improving year to year from 2016. The department will continue to encourage officers to spend time checking hotels and meeting hotel staff as a way to develop relationships and gain information about potential criminal activity at hotels. This will encompass a growing focus on prostitution and drug activity. Further, officers can act as village ambassadors through the increased presence at hotels, interacting with guests and visitors.
